Teeth: Some kittens will not lose their baby teeth when their adult teeth come in. These extra teeth, commonly referred to as retained deciduous teeth, can cause numerous problems for your pet. We therefore routinely pull any baby teeth present at the time of the spay/neuter.

Future Vaccinations: All vaccines (FVRCP, FeLV, and Rabies) are boosted after one year and will be due again around 16 months of age. Indoor only cats do not necessarily need to receive all three vaccines. Your veterinarian will make specific recommendations based on your pet's unique lifestyle.

Post-Vaccination: It is not uncommon for a kitten to be a little sore or sleepy a few days after receiving vaccines. Please let us know if your kitten has any signs lasting longer than a couple days.
